


President's Comments

We wish everyone a very happy & prosperous New Year!





Town of Clarence Founded 1808

Clarence is the oldest existing town in Erie County. As a Ransom came to the area in 1799 and opened his tavern in Clarence Hollow. In 1803, he also opened a gristmill and sawmill. Four years later, in 1807, As a Harris opened a tavern in what is now known as Harris Hill. Today, the building is a dry cleaners on Main Street near Harris Hill Road.

The Town of Clarence was established in 1808. Two years later, in 1810, William Spoor opened a second inn in Clarence Hollow, where it is claimed U.S. presidents Millard Fillmore, Grover Cleveland and James Monroe all stayed at one time or another. The building survives and is now a private home at Main Street and Salt Road.

The Town of Clarence is known for:

The oldest existing town in Erie County, Clarence had a Native American presence before white settlers arrived. Its early existence was as an agricultural community.

Included in our town are:

Clarence, Clarence Center, East Amherst, Harris Hill, Hunts Corners, Millersport, Rapids, Swormville and Wolcottsburg.

Important people in our town's history include:

Asa Ransom - Opened a tavern in Clarence Hollow in 1799 and a gristmill and sawmill in 1803.

Wilson Greatbatch - Developed the first implantable pacemaker in the early 1960s.

Our present major sites/attributes:

Goodrich Landow Log Cabin - Ca. 1825 cabin, moved from Goodrich Rd. to the campus of the Clarence History Museum in 1990.


Leising Block Home - Ca.1909, house constructed of cement blocks made by John P. Leising. Leising invented a machine to make hollow concrete blocks and for many years remained in the concrete block business. Many area homes were built upon blocks from his plant.

Sites on the National Register of Historic Places:

Eshelman Store - Established in 1872, it was at one time the tallest building in Erie County outside of Buffalo.



Early settlers, many of whom were farmers, shaped the town over the next 20 years. Levi Goodrich constructed a log cabin on Goodrich Road in 1825. It was moved to the present Clarence History Museum campus in 1990, where it was restored. Businesses also made their mark on Clarence. In 1872, John Eshelmann and his nephew A.G. Eshelman opened the Square Deal general store at the four corners in Clarence Center. The building stands at the northwest corner of Goodrich and Clarence Center Road and is on the National Register of Historic Places. It currently houses the Perfect Gift store.

As the town continued to grow, many churches were established in the mid-1800s. The New York, West Shore & Buffalo Railroad began construction in Clarence Hollow in 1882 and the first West Shore train crossed Main Street two years later. A mural of a train crossing Main Street is on the side of the Clarence Bowling Academy in Clarence Hollow on Main Street near Salt Road. In 1897, Carl Landow and Carl Newman of Wolcottsburg constructed a wood-framed, hand-operated carousel. It held chariots and horses for the riders. Music was provided by a hand organ.

Businesses continued to flourish in the early 1900s. John P. Leising built his cement block home on Transit Road, Swormville, in 1909. This uniquely constructed house is still standing at 9980 Transit Road. Construction on another structure using Leising cement blocks began in 1911. This was the I.O.O.F. Clarence Lodge on the East Hill, in Clarence Hollow. Today, the build-



ing houses a shop operated by T. Tschopp. It was that same year that the Automobile Club of Buffalo built their clubhouse in Clarence. This structure was purchased by the town in 1957. It is next to the Clarence History Museum and is also on the National Register of Historic Places.

Clarence's industries continued to grow throughout the 20th century. In 1958, Wilson Greatbatch quit his job and for the next two years worked on developing the first implantable pacemaker. His workshop was located in his barn on Bodine Road. The red barn and upstairs workshop were moved and attached to the Clarence History Museum in 1995. The museum also houses many of the early pacemakers.

Erie County Fair 2021

Congratulations to Trustee Daniel Gamin on his prize winning Baldwin Apples and Orange Quince. Dan has been entering and winning ribbons for his apples and quince since 1981. The only year he did not enter was in 2020 due to the Fair being cancelled.


New Exhibits Coming in 2022!

Posthumous award made to Cpl. Hens

Cpl. J. Michael Hens, who lost his life in the Vietnamese War, has been awarded, posthumously, the Republic of


awarded, posthumously, the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Honor Medal, Second Class, with Meritorious Citation.

The medal was presented to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edwin J. Hens Jr., 6511 Conner Rd., East Amherst, Friday (April 21, by Major George J. Stemlow, USMC, assisted by Sgt. Donald W. Preston Jr., both of the Instruction Insepction Staff, India Co., Third Battalion of the 25th Marines Third Battalion of the 25th Marines.

Cpl. Hens has also been awarded the following medals, all posthumously: Purple Heart, National Defense Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, New York State Conspicuous Service Cross, Republic of Vietnam Service Medal, Presidential Citation with Ribbon Bar, Republic of Vietnam Unit Citation with Palm and Frame, and the Combat Action Ribbon.
