Commemorating The 250th The Shope Cemetery

Recent research has led me to the oldest cemetery in the Town of Clarence, the Shope Cemetery (1814-1852). As part of the commemoration of the 250th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, I have been exploring the connections Clarence had to the Declaration. While no direct connections to the Declaration of Independence can be found, I have found several connections to the Revolutionary War in the form of veterans who fought in the war and eventually ended up in Clarence. Two of these soldiers are buried in the Shope Cemetery - John Felton Sr. and Ephraim Derreck.

Located on Hillcrest Road, the Shope Cemetery is one of the older cemeteries in Western New York. The property was originally purchased from the Holland Land Company by Sylvanus Felton on April 19th, 1808. Abraham Shope eventually bought it and thus the name Shope Cemetery. The Parks Department has been doing a great job maintaining the cemetery for many years. However, time has taken its toll on the gravestones. Many are hard to read, falling over or completely down or buried. If you notice that not many of the gravestones stood up in the 1950's and it is worse today. One of my goals as historian is to repair and restore this cemetery and other pioneer cemeteries around town.

Just two months after the signing of the Declaration of Independence Ephraim fought at the Battle of Harlem Heights, at the age of 20. The battle was a significant early win for the Americans, and Ephraim was fighting alongside other men from the 1st Regiment of the Connecticut Troops under Col. John Durkee. A year later in 1777 he fought at the Battle of Germantown in Pennsylvania. The last battle before Washington wintered at Valley Forge. He fought again in 1778 at the Battle of Monmouth on June 28, 1778. He was discharged at Westfield, New Jersey in December, 1779. He will make his way west and eventually end up in Clarence thirty years after his last battle, settling in town in 1808. He served as the Postmaster for the Town in 1816. The Postmaster was a very important job for the town, helping to get the only form of communication with the outside world to the pioneers of Clarence.

John Felton Sr. is claimed to be buried at the Shope Cemetery. He fought at the Battle of Saratoga, the turning point in the American Revolution. The French decided they would join the American cause to assist in defeating the British. Unfortunately, the war would rage on for another six years after the Battle of Saratoga. His gravestone has yet to be discovered. Several other Felton's are buried in the Shope Cemetery. He may have been buried within the only iron fence at the cemetery. There is room for two gravestones within the fenced area, but no gravestones. More investigation needs to be done to see who was buried within the fenced area.

Other known local legends include family members of the Ransoms, Hulls, Spoor's and Horner's. It is believed that between 21-41 (+-) individuals are buried at the cemetery. Since there are several family names in this cemetery it is believed that it was a church cemetery and not a family plot. When Oneta Baker, the town's first historian, assessed the cemetery in the 1950's many of the gravestones were unrecognizable. Today only a few stones are still legible. The pictures were taken in the 1950s. It might be noted that when Oneta Baker became Town Historian only a few "old-timers" even knew of the cemetery's existence.

Other People of Note: Rosanna Miles died in 1838 at the age of 26. She lies next to her infant son, who died in 1837. She was married to Reverend Milo N. Miles. Her story reminds us of the hardships of life during the early 1800's on the frontier. Elijah Leach was the deacon in the first Baptist Church at Hunts Corners, who died June 11, 1841. William Spoor built and ran the Spoor's Hotel at Salt and Main Street in the Hollow around 1810. Lieutenant Sylvanus Felton was the son of John and Persis Rogers Felton. He was born Aug. 22, 1785 in Marlboro N.H. who died at the Battle of Fort Erie, August 28th, 1814 during the War of 1812, at the age of 29.

Known Names Buried: The town Assessor's office reports that 41 graves are located at the Shope Cemetery, but only around 20-30 gravestones exist. The list below is from several different accounts and lists found in the Historian's Office. This is by no means a complete or accurate list. Several names and dates may be miss-spelled or wrong. - **Felton, Jedidiah:** Feb. 2(2), 1773, d. Dec. 27, 1824, age 51 yrs. Had 2 daughters w/ 1st wife and 7 daughters with 2nd wife.
- **Felton, John Sr.:** b. Nov. 9, 1741, d. 1820 Revolutionary War Veteran
- **Felton, Levi:** b. Jul 22, 1776, d. Jun 16, 1813. Lt. Sylvanus, Fell at Fort Erie, Aug 28, 1814, age 29 yrs

Felton, Lieut. Sylvanus: b. Aug. 22, 1785, d. Aug. 27, 1814, age 28 yrs. Died serving his country in the War of 1812
